### 100 new foster homes in 100 days!

Have you seen one of these foster pet yard signs in your neighborhood? If not, be the first of your neighbors to accept the Mesa County Foster Pet Challenge! This summer, we partnered with Mesa County with a goal of finding 100 new foster families in 100 days (June 13-Sept 21).

Mesa County's animal shelters are approaching capacity, due primarily to a lack of affordable pet-friendly housing in the valley and financial struggles worsened by the rising cost of living — plus, kitten season is still upon us, which means we welcome new batches of kittens almost every week.

Fortunately, there is a fun, effective, community-based solution that greatly expands the capacity of our shelters at no cost to you: **fostering!** When a pet walks out of Roice-Hurst with a foster family, a kennel opens up for another pet in need.

We've made it over 75% of the way to our goal — help us make it across the finish line! We challenge you to open your heart and home to a foster pet. Learn more and sign up at RHhumanesociety.org/foster!

# From the CEO's Desk

"The dog days of summer" takes on a whole different meaning when you work in animal welfare! **Every** summer, we stay extremely busy — and this year, that has proven especially true.

The truth is that this year has been especially challenging not only for Roice-Hurst, but for shelters everywhere. Across the country, animal shelters are seeing long waiting lists, full kennels, and new arrivals daily. The cost of almost everything (including running an animal shelter) has increased, and more people are facing the heartbreaking decision to rehome a beloved pet.

To compound our challenges, the United States is facing a shortage of veterinary

professionals that the American Veterinary Medical Association expects will persist, and there are more unaltered pets in our community than spay/neuter appointments available.

Like many nonprofits and businesses in this labor market, we've also faced chronic shortstaffing, which means our team is working extra hard to meet the growing needs of our community and keep pets and their people happy and united.

Our **Pet Pantry** is providing crucial pet food and supplies to those who can't make ends meet. Our Homeward Hounds collaboration with HomewardBound is providing dignified shelter for people experiencing homelessness with their pets. Our crisis boarding



program is allowing pet owners time to get back on their feet without having to worry about losing a beloved pet during a time of crisis. And of course, we're providing safety and compassionate care to hundreds of pets in our community that need it most.

Despite the challenges we've faced this year, the impact we're making would not be possible without you: our donors, fosters, volunteers, and adopters. Your support is changing and saving lives.

# Found kittens? Here's what to do!

With warm months comes kitten season, which means all summer, kittens have been popping up in the strangest places — under porches, in sheds, bushes, fields, you name it! If you spend time outside during kitten season, you're bound to find a kitten somewhere (or know someone who will!)

If you're an animal lover, your first instinct will likely be to scoop them up and take them to safety. But wait! Assess the situation and make a plan before intervening.

So, you've found a kitten. What now? Your next step depends on the kitten's age, condition, and the overall situation.



### **AGE** 0-5 weeks old

These tiny, uncoordinated kittens are dependent on mom and should stay with her until weaned.



#### 6-11 weeks old

These bouncy, independent kittens are the perfect age to join a foster program!



#### 12+ weeks old

If feral, these large, lanky kittens are difficult to socialize and may need to be Trap-Neuter-Returned.

### **CONDITION & SITUATION**

If a kitten looks to be clean, alert, plump, and not in distress, mom is likely nearby and has been doing a great job! Newborn kittens have the best chance of survival when being cared for by mom. If the kittens are safe where they are and mom is feral, it's best to simply monitor the family until the babies are weaned around 6 weeks old. At that point, you can bring them home or find placement for them. And don't forget to get mom spayed!

However, if you find newborn kittens and it's clear that mom is not coming back, or if kittens of any age are sick, injured, or in danger, it's time to intervene. Contact Roice-Hurst for further instruction and assistance.

# Mad Eye Moody


