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Solving the Veterinary Shortage

From the CEO's Desk

In 2022, Roice-Hurst Humane Society's programs served a surging number of pets and people. On the surface, this increased impact seems to be reason for celebration. After all, almost 200 more pets joined new families in 2022 than the year prior!

In actuality, the across-the-board rise in overall pet intake and demand for support programs is indicative of a community facing increased barriers to remaining united with their pets — barriers including a lack of affordable, pet-friendly housing and rising inflation.

To make matters more challenging, as intakes increased in 2022, access to routine veterinary care for shelters and pet owners alike restricted due to a national veterinary workforce shortage.

Because unaltered pets filtered through our doors faster than spay/neuter surgery appointments became available, we pivoted to a temporary foster-to-adopt system in 2022 to bypass the bottleneck, moving pets into foster care with their soon-to-be adopters until surgery was performed.

Through collaboration with a wide array of partner vet clinics, traveling relief veterinarians, veterinary educators and students, and contract vets, we battled the backlog of spay/neuter surgeries all year long.

From The CEO's Desk: Veterinary Shortage

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As the co-chair of the Animal Welfare Association of Colorado (AWAC)'s Advocacy Committee, I am proud to represent Roice-Hurst Humane Society and rural Colorado at the state level to propose solutions to this veterinary shortage.

Through the Vet Care Coalition,
AWAC has advocated for the
Increasing Access to Veterinary
Care Package, a three-pronged
legislative solution to expand
Colorado's veterinary workforce.

The first prong is to increase access to care by codifying **veterinary telehealth**. This technology has been successful in human medicine for years, and expanding its use to veterinary medicine will enable more animals to receive timely care, especially in rural areas.

Secondly, we can maximize staff efficiency by expanding the role of **Veterinary Technician Specialists**.

By providing and recognizing additional training and credentialing in certain specialties, Vet Tech Specialists will

specialties, Vet Tech Specialists will have better support, compensation, and career opportunities.

Finally, the creation of a mid-level veterinary practitioner called a Veterinary Professional Associate

(VPA) will help veterinary clinics meet demand for services by expanding the veterinary workforce. This Master's degree-educated role will be comparable to a human Physician's Assistant — examining pets, diagnosing minor conditions, performing non-thoracic surgeries, and leading healthcare teams.

Love on Wheels

This winter, five nearly-identical small dogs were rescued from unsanitary living conditions by Delta authorities. Six-year-old Merlin was in the worst shape of them all — unable to stand or walk, incontinent, and covered in mats and waste.

At first, Merlin was so weak and immobile that he needed to be flipped from one side to the other every few hours to prevent sores.



After a vet exam, a thorough cleaning and grooming, a delicious meal, and a fateful move into the most loving foster home, Merlin's spirits lifted. What he lacked in physical ability, he made up for in sweetness and charisma.

Finding an adoptive home for a disabled pet is often a long and taxing challenge. Luckily for Merlin, he was home all along! His foster mom Jenna loved him so much, she decided to promote him to a permanent family member.

Today, after months of physical therapy, Merlin zooms around the house in his homemade wheelchair and is living the life he's always deserved.

"He's getting stronger every day," Jenna said. "I wouldn't trade this little guy for anything."

Merlin recently began standing and stumbling unassisted — a hopeful testament to the incredible love his family has poured into him.

Dear Coraline, How can I make sure my pets stay safe and cared for in a crisis or emergency situation?

In my eight years at Roice-Hurst, I've witnessed thousands of pets find homes. Sadly, I've also seen thousands of pets become separated from loving families due to lost housing, financial hardship, owner illness or death, and other heartbreaking emergencies.

Spring cleaning is the purrfect time to get organized and prepared. Ensure your pet is easily identifiable and all information is up-to-date. Put together a pet emergency kit, complete with pet supplies, first aid, and vet records.

With my expurrt guidance, Roice– Hurst offers a variety of support programs to help you remain united with your pet through tough times.

Owner illness or death is the third most common reason pets come through our doors. Create or update your will to include plans for your pets and detailed instructions for a future caregiver.
