It Takes a Veterinary Village

If you've visited Roice-Hurst, you've probably seen the mobile veterinary clinic parked in front of the shelter, which was purchased in 2019 with funds from a generous legacy gift. Inside, a team of talented vet professionals is hard at work!

Shelter pets and community pets receive the care they need at Roice-Hurst thanks to a robust network of veterinary partnerships.

Fantastic vets like Dr. Anneke
Moresco and Dr. Terry McQuade
perform spay/neuter surgeries
aboard the bus, a rotating lineup
of several other talented
veterinarians administer vaccines
and microchips at our public lowcost vaccination clinics, and more
than a dozen local vet hospitals
offer guidance, services, and
equipment to our vet team as
needed. It truly takes a village!

During the school year, the mobile clinic is a classroom to students studying veterinary technology at Colorado Mesa University Tech.

Students learn crucial skills assisting their professor, Dr. Moresco, as she performs surgeries on shelter pets.

"We have these great partnerships because we're all sharing knowledge and working toward a common goal," RHHS Vet Services Manager Caitlyn Murphy, RVT, said.

So far in 2024, more than 500 pets have been spayed/neutered on the vehicle, and 500 more owned pets received low-cost vaccinations. This year, services were deployed to highneed areas including the Unhoused Resource Center and Delta

His mom, Celeste Miller, is an experienced kitten caregiver specializing in saving the most vulnerable kittens, whether orphaned, sick, injured, or disabled. She began fostering in 2010, and having baby Kruz didn't slow her down.

"My life was already hectic with a little human, so what's one more thing to add?" Celeste said. "Caring for animals teaches kids kindness and empathy."

Feeding, playing with, and caring for kittens has been a daily occurrence throughout Kruz's childhood, and over the years, he's become quite an expert.

Kruz's bottle-feeding skills even impressed well-known kitten rescuer, Hannah Shaw, best known as Kitten Lady, when she hosted a kitten care workshop with Roice-Hurst in May!

Each day, pets and people find the help they need at Roice-Hurst Humane Society.

These are just a couple of our most heartfelt stories of pets we met recently.

No Eyes, No Problem!

This summer, a tiny orange kitten named Braille was discovered living outdoors by himself. He had no eyes, was battling a serious upper respiratory infection, and, at five weeks old, was much smaller than he should've been.

At Roice–Hurst, Braille received the stabilizing care he needed and moved into foster care with a wonderful vet tech. Life started looking up!

Just a few days of medicine and love made a world of difference. Who needs eyeballs anyway?

"He is so determined," his foster, Desiree, said. "He gets around great. We will continue to love him until he is ready for his very special forever home. He is going to be an amazing cat." At his foster home, Braille spends his days soaking up the sunshine, hanging out with his canine buddy, and growing stronger each day.

But Braille's journey is not over yet soon, he'll undergo surgery to remove what ocular tissue remains to avoid medical issues down the road. Then, he'll be ready for his big adoption day!

Even without sight, Braille knows his future is bright!



Remembering Odis

Odis' story is one of love, gratitude, and compassion, illuminating the difficult yet vital role that shelters like Roice-Hurst often occupy in the lives of those who need us most.

Odis wandered the streets as a stray before he was brought to Roice-Hurst's Delta satellite facility by a kind stranger.

It wasn't long before he had our whole team wrapped around his paw – we adored all 102 pounds of this big, goofy boy!



But then, we received crushing news. A routine exam for a presumed ankle injury from his time on the streets revealed the worst - **Odis was diagnosed with osteosarcoma, an aggressive malignant bone cancer.**Odis was a hospice case.

A volunteer took him home to fulfill his wildest dreams. He spent his final days indulging in decadent meals, sleeping in a warm bed, playing unlimited tugof-war, walking at sunset, and visiting the shelter to be pampered by his forever family – our team.

We said goodbye to Odis knowing that he felt the love, comfort, and compassion that every dog deserves in these moments, but not all are fortunate enough to receive.

While Odis' story is a tear-jerker, we share it because it highlights the profound impact shelters make on sick animals who have no one else to love and grieve them. We are so grateful that, with your support, terminal pets like Odis experience comfort and love until the very end.
